Tools for Instruction

Decode Compound Words

A compound word is made of two component words; for example: *airplane* is made up of *air* and *plane*. Developing readers learn to look for familiar words within the longer word and to put them together to say the compound. Two-syllable compound words can be a useful introduction to the concept of syllables, because the syllables naturally break apart at the word boundaries. For each of the following activities, select compound words from the word list **Compound Words** (page 2) that are appropriate for your students.

Three Ways to Teach

Find the Base Words 10–15 minutes

- Name a two-syllable compound word and clap each syllable, inviting students to clap along.
- Display the compound word. Have students name the two words that make up the compound word. Draw a slash mark in the word to show where to divide the syllables.

snow/storm pan/cake flash/light pea/nut

• Display one or two compound words for students to divide on their own. Students may then play the role of teacher and explain to a learner how to read a compound word.

Build Compound Words 10-15 minutes

- Prepare a set of word cards by breaking apart compound words and writing the component words on separate word cards.
- Display the cards and have students read them.
- Challenge students to put the cards together in pairs to make real compound words. Read the compound words together and discuss their meanings.

Use Clues to Make Compound Words 10-15 minutes

Display a list of compound words. Provide oral clues using both words in the compound. Have students identify and then write the compound word. See the examples below.

a shelf for books (bookshelf)

a pack to carry on your back (backpack)

a bird with black feathers (blackbird)

the light that comes from the sun (sunlight)

Check for Understanding

lf you observe	Then try	
difficulty identifying both component words in a compound	using compound words that share a base word, such as <i>raincoat, rainstorm,</i> and <i>snowstorm</i> . Guide students to use the shared word to tell how the compounds are alike.
