- **absentee ballot**: a ballot that can be mailed in

**adamant**: having a strong opinion

- **adversary**: someone who is against someone else; an opponent
- **affluence**: having a lot of money **aghast**: struck with amazement or
- horror; shocked **agribusiness**: the business of making money by growing crops and raising animals
- **amendment**: an addition or change to a constitution
- **animism**: a belief that both living and non-living things have spirits
- **aquifer**: a layer of rock that holds water

ardent: with much feeling

arid: very dry

- **barter**: to trade without the use of money
- **basalt**: gray or black fine-grained igneous rock; cooled lava rock
- **bill**: a written idea for a law submitted to the legislature
- **bounty**: money paid to a person for killing certain animals
- **breach**: to make a gap or break, such as in the walls of a dam

cache: a large supply hidden from view

**capital**: money and goods needed to start a business

**capitalism**: an economic system where land and businesses are owned and run by citizens, not the government

- **capitalist**: a person of wealth; a person who supports private ownership of land and business
- **cataracts**: large waterfalls over steep cliffs

**Caucasian**: of European ancestry; non-Indian and non-African

- **censorship**: the action of examining publications for objectionable statements
- checks and balances: a system that limits the power of any one branch of government

**civilian**: not in the military

**clear-cut**: a place where all of the trees have been cut down

**coerce**: to force

**commercial**: having to do with selling

- **commodity**: any useful thing that is bought or sold; products of agriculture, mining, or manufacturing
- **communism**: a system where land and businesses are owned and run by the government

**compound interest**: interest that is figured on both the original amount of the loan plus accrued interest

**compromise**: an agreement where both sides give up part of what they want to solve a conflict

**condensed milk**: milk from which part of the water has been removed; canned milk

**confluence**: the flowing together of two or more streams

**conservation**: a careful preservation and protection of something, especially land and natural resources

**conspiracy**: a plot or secret agreement to do an unlawful or wrongful act

**continental drift**: the theory that the earth's continents were one land mass and then drifted apart

**cooperative**: an organization owned and operated for the benefit of those using its services

**coroner**: a person who investigates unusual deaths

**corporation**: a group of people authorized by law to invest money to start or run a business

**coulee**: a dry streambed; a small shallow ravine

**credit card**: a card that authorizes purchases on credit and accumulates interest

**debit card**: a card where the cost of purchases will be subtracted from a bank balance without incurring interest

**decade**: a period of ten years

**decimate**: to kill a large number of the population

**decompose**: to decay or rot **deficient**: not having enough degradation: the decline or ruin of **delude**: to mislead or trick someone **deluge**: a heavy rain

- **dentalium shells**: long thin seashells worn as jewelry and used for trade by Native Americans
- **derogatory**: uncomplimentary; belittling
- **desecrate**: to treat with lack of respect **destitute**: with almost no means of

financial support; without the necessities of life

**dilapidated**: run down, shabby, or out of repair

**domestic arts**: skills relating to housework; cleaning, cooking, sewing

**domestic servant**: a person who does housework

dormant: temporarily inactive

**down payment**: the money given at the time a loan is arranged

**ecology**: the study of the interrelation of animals and plants with their environment

**economics**: the making, buying, and selling of goods and services

- **ecosystem**: a community of living things that interact and depend on each other
- **electors**: people selected to vote (for president)
- elusive: hidden from view

**entrepreneur**: a person who starts and runs a business

**erratic**: a huge boulder carried long distances by a glacier

evacuate: to leave

**executive branch**: the branch of government that carries out the laws

**exodus**: a mass departure **exploit**: to use to an unfair advantage

**exports**: goods shipped out for sale

**fastidious**: having high standards

**fault lines**: break in the earth's crust

with displacement of earth and rock on one side

- **federal government**: the level of government for all the United States
- **feminism**: having to do with women's issues and rights
- **finite**: having definite limits
- **fissure**: a long crack in the earth's crust
- **fjord**: a narrow inlet of the sea between steep cliffs
- **forensic anthropologist**: a person who determines the cause of death of ancient humans
- formidable: causing fear or dread

**fraud**: deceit, especially to get someone to part with something of value

**free enterprise**: an economic system where citizens own and control most production, buying, and selling

**geography**: the study of the earth and the location and activities of the people, plants, and animals living on it

**geologic time**: the long time period of the earth's history as defined by scientists

**geologist**: a scientist who studies rock and land formations to learn the history of the earth

**goods**: items that are made, bought, and sold

**grade** (roads): to smooth out the ground to make a road

**groundwater**: water that is naturally in the ground

**habitat**: the place where a plant or animal lives

headwaters: where a river starts

**heavy metals**: lead, zinc, cadmium, and arsenic

**hinterland**: land isolated from other places by distance and access

**human characteristics**: land features made by people

**humane**: having compassion or consideration

**hydroelectric**: relating to electricity produced by water-powered generators

**igneous rock**: rock that came from the interior of the earth as lava

**immortal**: exempt from death; living forever

**immunity**: resistance to disease

incense: to make very upset and angry

**industrial arts**: skills relating to industry; carpentry and the use of machines

**inferior**: of lower quality or importance

**infirmary**: a place where the sick are taken care of

**inflation**: a rise in the general price level of goods and services

**initiative**: a process by which citizens can write a bill and get it on the ballot for the voters to pass or defeat

**insatiable**: not able to get enough **irony**: a result or outcome opposite of

what was expected

**judicial branch**: the branch of government that interprets the law and determines punishment

Kanaka: a Hawaiian man

**lahar**: huge mudflow filled of volcanic debris, rock, and water

**leach**: to seep or pass down through the soil

**legislative branch**: the branch of government that makes the laws

**legislators**: members of Congress; men and women who are elected to make laws

**libel**: a statement that defames or ruins another person's character

**lobbyist**: a person who studies issues and works to get legislators to vote for or against bills

**loess**: soil believed to be mainly deposited by wind

**longshoremen**: workers who load and unload ships

lucrative: producing wealth

**mass transit**: buses, trains, or subway systems that move large numbers of people at a time

**materialism**: an emphasis on material objects and comforts with a disinterest in cultural values.

median: the middle

menial: requiring little skill

**migrant**: a person who moves regularly to find work, especially in agriculture

**minimum wage**: the lowest amount of money a business can pay an employee

**molten**: melted by high heat, as in liquid rock

**monopoly**: when one company has exclusive ownership and control of a type of product

**motley**: a mixture of different or unusual people

**municipal**: of the city

**negotiate**: to talk to another person or group to settle a matter

**Paleo-Indians**: the first people who lived on the American continents

**partnership**: when two or more people own a business

per capita: per person

**philanthropy**: the generous giving of money to worthy causes

**physical features**: the natural landforms and characteristics of a place

placid: calm, smooth

**political party**: a group of people who have similar ideas about government

**porcelain**: the material ceramic dishes are made from

**potlatch**: a large celebration of feasting and gifts held to celebrate a special event

precinct: a voting region

**primary election**: the first election held to narrow down the list of candidates

**proprietorship**: when one person owns a business

**protohistoric**: when there was a drastic change in the lifestyle of the American Indians

radical: drastic, extreme

radioactive: having nuclear properties

**ransom**: money paid to get back someone who has been kidnapped

**ration**: a small supply given on a regular basis

**reactor**: a machine that produces nuclear energy

**recall**: to remove a person from public office

**reclamation project**: a large project, such as the building of a dam, whose purpose is to make better use of the land

**referendum**: a process by which legislative bills are put on the public ballot

**relief** (art): where a design is above the background

**repatriate**: to return artifacts to the place of origin

- **repeal**: to cancel (a law) by official authority
- **representative**: a person elected to make laws for the whole group

**resurrect**: to rejoin the spirit and the body

**retail**: having to do with selling in stores

retaliate: to fight back

revenue: money brought in from a sale

**sabotage**: the destruction of property or materials

**salary**: a set amount of money paid by the week or month

**sanitation**: relating to health,

cleanliness, disposal of human waste **sedimentary** rock: rock formed from

sand, soil, rocks, and shells
