Classroom Nuts and Bolts:

- Reading Homework Reading practice is extremely important, but it also needs to occur naturally. Sometimes we read for 20 minutes, other times for longer. Your child should be reading independently for at least 100 minutes per week.
- Math Homework- It is important for your student to be fluent (able to immediately solve) their addition and subtraction facts! Practicing for 10 minutes a day will help these facts to become memorized.
 Only when addition and subtraction is fluent should students then begin working on multiplication facts.
- Play: Lots of learning takes place when kids play. This is a critical part of their development. Free play is homework too!
- Community: During the first couple of weeks of school a lot of time will be spent on building a strong learning community. A strong learning community is essential to the success of all students.
- Student Health: Get lots of rest! Students do better academically, behaviorally, and socially with good rest. Our brains need sleep to grow and learn. School-age children need 10-12 hours of sleep a night (Kidshealth. Org).
